will be presented by the artists and technologists that utilize these materials in their own work. The AV Bar was also developed to help make collecting film and video art more enjoyable. The artists and technologists presenting at the A/V Bar will answer questions around collection and presentation of moving image works and will allow for opportunities to participate in the creation of new work. Appointments for the Moving Image AV Bar can be requested in person at the Moving Image New York 2014 front desk during regular fair hours. The Moving Image AV Bar is open each day of the fair from 12 - 4 PM.

Joint Exhibition

In conjunction with the Moving Image Fair, Eyebeam will co-organize a moving image exhibition during the fair that will feature artists from previous residencies, to be held within walking distance of the fair at Eyebeam's location in Chelsea. The exhibition will include a new Augmented Reality performance "The Alices" by Claudia Hart, Honorary Fellow at Eyebeam. Performers for "The Alices" include Nayland Blake, Claudia Hart, Joon Lee, Julie Robinson and Adrian Saiche. More details on the exhibition will be announced in the coming months.

Founded in 1997, Eyebeam was conceived as a non-profit art and technology center dedicated to exposing broad and diverse audiences to new technologies and media arts, while simultaneously establishing and demonstrating new media as a significant genre of cultural production.
